
Celebrating Achievements in the CL Psychiatry Division

Dr. Luis Rosas-Vidal Identifies Key Brain Chemical Linked to Fear and Anxiety

A new study explores how the brain's natural cannabinoid, 2-AG, may help regulate fear responses — offering insight into why individuals with PTSD and anxiety often experience heightened or inappropriate fear. **Luis Rosas-Vidal, PhD, MD**, Assistant Professor of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and first author of the study, found that reduced 2-AG levels were linked to overgeneralized fear responses in both mice and human participants. Published in the Journal of Clinical Investigation, the findings point to 2-AG as a potential target for future anxiety treatments.
